It's my pleasure to have on 3 CR today. The author of a wonderful new book that move has been released in the last couple of months and on the show today. Gosh, I look as I've got to say it before.

Anyway, that and that's dial-up internet. It's well, kept before we go any further though. Can I just check in if it's okay to ask with, which pronouns you use, if any

Yeah, of course. I use they/them pronouns awesome. And I, we love, we respect all genders on this program and we're all for doing a bit of binary busting which is very awesome. And youth, you've done it with this awesome book The Spectacular suit. When I first got informed that this was coming and I saw just even the cover and a bit of the art, the Artistry. And of course, this is an illustrated book, which I want to talk about it sort of was just like yay and

Tell us about just to start off with how the, the idea for the book came about.

I think, I mean, these things always take a long, long time longer than you realize. I think I first started thinking about the book. Well, two or three years ago. Now, I'm times become a bit of a vacuum for obvious reasons, as well. But it was, I think I was talking

with friends, other queer friends of mine, other non-binary, trans Mass friends and talking about those early experiences.

Of childhood like, you know, childhood memories. And obviously childhood memory becomes a strange thing when you identify as trans and non-binary because of course, there's the two separate selves that not in conflict with each other, but I having to figure out how to exist side by side, when you're younger especially and trying to pinpoint that in a way that felt like it could be translated to a kid or back to that same kid that I was back, then if that makes sense. And yes, I think clothing became clothing is like, the ultimate

Function of self-expression and not always in the best way. I suppose, there's so much gender pressure in that as well. And it seems so simple to go back to that time to a birthday party. Well, to one of my birthday parties, when all deep down. All I really wanted was to wear a suit because, of course, that was like, the smartest most amazing thing that I saw, my dad leaving for work every day and then that I saw in and around, there's only a small town, but in the wrong town, we lived in

And never obviously voicing that as a kid and wondering what would happen, you know, different times. Now, if the kid did feel brave enough to voice that and what how that could be celebrated. And yeah, that would be was that's long answer for what was very straightforward. It's just a childhood memory reimagined. Well, well, well wait, sometimes things can be straight forward on this show but not very often. But seriously, I think you've you've raised a really, really good points.

This is something there's so many things to unpack in the in your answer that, you know, and I what I did. But you know, while you're the guest, they do feel, I want to affirm what you're saying is sometimes when I recall my childhood and early years. Now, the only if it comes up in a dream or literally in a dream at night, I don't feel like I look like the even the person I was even, you know, it just it's very blurry. I totally get what you mean and it does it all. So we don't

Aunt. I think it's transgender diverse and non-binary people. We do sometimes feel like a child towards taken away from us, we don't get the childhood that we wanted because we've had to live it in other ways of gender identity, gender expression, and going to the

ball park next door, sexual romantic orientation. So totally affirm that and very strongly empathized with you. But also, you know, the fact that you said it was a long night, all it is important to explain that this has been sitting in your mind for

Well, yes, if 20 or 30 years or something, since it happened, and then finally, you're talking about, it all came up when you started talking about an idea for a book. So I think it's a perfectly Fair answer is I really wanted to affirm that. It's really important and we all wanted to. I just feel have clothes that will make it. We all want to feel good in everything and make them feel good and that includes clothes. So when these came

I'm up a couple of idea couple of years ago then had this idea for the book. Now. You are the writer. It says on the front page written by a cat Patrick, but there's you have a very important collaborator. How did all this whole process come from idea to where we are in the middle of 2021? Where I am sitting here with a hard copy of a book in front of me.

And it was well, I approached scribble Miriam at Scrabble with that idea with a manuscript. Essentially. I can't I can't draw Norm wants to see a kids book that I've drawn that something about to see. So Mary took the manuscript and then went out to Source, an illustrator, somebody who would be able to and I'm not that it wasn't a complicated manuscript, but I think it has so much Nuance in it. That is specific to that experience. And I think that

Mary did an amazing job and finding Haley & his also based in here in the UK, and they took the manuscript and just did an incredible job of that. I've never, I mean, I've worked with, it's the first time I've ever really had a picture book where I've not collaborate with someone from the start. This was the first picture book where it's been a manuscript that then went to an illustrator and I don't really have much to do with that process. But Haley, read the manuscript, and immediately understood it, and the illustrations, they did almost from

The get-go were perfect and the book as it is is better than I ever could have imagined. I think it's a wonderful thing with

Only doing the writing portion of it. As you have this very interesting creative experience where we have to kind of let go of the text at a certain point and not be

You have to entrust it. Somebody else in a way that's quite wild that doesn't really exist in a lot of other writing disciplines anyway, and you get to see it kind of reformed and retranslated. And also process by somebody else, which is such an amazing thing to think about to do and work within. So yeah, that's how I think that answer the question, how it came about from there. And then obviously just the usual that's why kids books always take longer than you think. We were obviously working through the pandemic here in the

Okay, we're working right through the first part of that. So it was complicated for lots of different reasons for both of us. But I think in the end we have a book that is something I'm really really proud of, you know, it's very, very proud of. Well, absolutely. And I I totally congratulate you on it and I deeply. Hope you are proud of it. I know that which Woods are dangerous word, but I think you should out of it and, you know, as well because it just, it really clicks. The thing that, you know,

Beats me, just even having a flip through it as low as look down at it. Now the dealer striations, the drawings do fit, you know, just so well with what you wrote. It's it was it, was it appears like you were almost side by side? In parallel process writing it yet. You had a manuscript and someone else came along and put the illustrations in perfectly. The sort of the analogy that comes to mind, which is a nice UK. Queer. Analogy is the old Elton John, Bernie talk.

Sort of seeing of to room. I'll take that. Yeah. Yeah, I think yeah what Haley did so well is they and something that you I think only can really Express if you understand it innately, is that the Expressions on Frankie's face and the body posturing like the shoulders like this about how much lives in your shoulders when you're a kid that is, you know, not able or not free to express themselves, the way they would like to. And I think that that, huh?

Punching that the sadness, the loneliness and I think it was just it's like, it was amazing to me the first time I saw those illustrations, I think I've cried the first time because it felt I felt so recognized by that in myself as well.

Well, you know the guy same thing. Yeah, I do. Remind me. I used to walk around stooping and hunting because perhaps I didn't feel confident in all parts of myself. And yes, you do you sort of touched on that that Nuance which is one that I would be honest and say that just having another look I hadn't quite noticed and of course the other thing just to link back to Elton and dirty is you did.

Give it teaser. You do end up with a wonderful pair of sunglasses in this book. I mean, Elton was known for his son. He's very much as Wells. Oh, definitely a shout-out to Elton. I'm not ashamed to admit that I was thinking, when I had like mood board. I had a mood board of Suits, like dream suits and so there was a bit of Patti Smith Elton, Janelle Monae and Elton was definitely a there are definitely a few Elton visuals on there as well. So it's like an amalgam of all my favorite suits throughout time. Well, it

It doesn't look. I have to bring that up now. I mean, I'm look, I'm the least most probably not the biggest marketing or injured person, but I'm feeling merge, merge merge. Come out of Left, Right and Center. I want a spectacular soup, please, after existing. That's a good idea. Oh, and if we've got budget, I'd like waistcoats. If we can just afford the waistcoats, that feel amazing. Well, that'll be cool, too. Definitely, but really the whole suit. Yeah. It's

Ends. Yeah, sort of. And the, and the Sonny's, I think have to go with her go without that, and it just, it does end up looking spectacular. So, hopefully, we're doing teases here. Other than spoilers to, I'm get people to hit, but

I think I wanted to have a story that felt like I wish I'd had at that age. Was that there's no sounds like a very cheesy thing to say, but I think sometimes is an interesting job to be writing books for children because you've got to be careful not to be.

You know, the best children's books of all time always speak directly to children. They don't project adult lives on to a child's life, you know, and I think I wanted to write a book that would assume open exactly to me at that age and what at least coming into that edge and it sort of gave permission for families as well. I think for the adults reading those books gave them a small glimpse, you know, it's not obviously it's only the smallest Glimpse or insight into what it's like to be that kid.

And how to facilitate. Yeah, how does the role of family and that book is what I think is really important, which is obviously I never said any of that stuff when I was a kid because God all those years ago. There wasn't the same language and the same but she's different time. I mean, I say that even at the age of 35, it was a different time and I think that being able to give a book to families that also helps families kind of process and move through those things to is really important.

Yeah, there's me. I was you've touched on a really good point there that. Yes. I don't know. There's a novel number of good points again to reflect back that so much in the book, you know, it does does talk to younger trans and gender diverse people that also talks to that sense of allyship, which just hadn't quite struck me, but I think the thing from a writing point of views. Now, I like what you said about there's a number of facts. I mean,

We often hear this phrase. If you could go back and tell your ex your old self. Yeah, what would you tell them? Well, you're telling it through a book and that seems both authentic. And so to me, but it does have that, well, in the broad sense of do it, I'll say childlike, innocence to how it is written. And so it doesn't feel if I say very warmly. It doesn't seem like it's an adults talking here at all. This is Frankie, who is how it's relatively young age.

Six years olds talking and it really came across that way. It also, yet that sense of Allied Shipping, the support that trans and gender diverse people. Need and of thankfully increasingly getting from their family of origin. And of course, we now have more of a family of choices while. So, you think you've touched on lots of good points there. The other thing I wanted to talk about was writing generally. Perhaps, what else have you written? Give that a mention and other sorts of

Writing of any sort that you have done and how you found that as a process.

I do. I do lots of kinds of writing these days. Especially, interesting journey. I think the first I wrote children's books for, I mean, I've always been writing, I suppose. But kids books were the first thing that I did. I mean, relatively successfully. I've got the other Doodle Cat books out and last year we had how come out as well. And then I also write for have just started writing for grownups now, as well. So short stories and I'm working on my first novel at the moment which is terrifying and but

Yeah, I'm always doing. Always doing lots of kinds of writing. I think it's children's books.

So unique, and so important to me, in terms of writing process, because like I said before, you have to kind of release this, look at various stages, the different people to then be translated and I love that. I love the collaborative of it. And I know I'm doing a novel. I definitely miss that collaborative effort. I feel very alone. Frank novel is very solo procedure in comparison by comparison. But yeah,

Side question. Do you consider yourself introvert, ambivert or extrovert? Maybe, Amber? I don't know. I go between introversion and be but I think probably most likely an introvert. I think I've been an introvert masquerading as an extrovert for the last 10 years. I think, I think is what I figured out about myself most recently. Well, what is this? A that introverts of here extroverted when they're talking about something. They're really passionate about which could be introversion so-so.

Definitely. Yeah, just just curious because I mean here, I might end very strongly to the introvert and just things and I don't, I have in terms of work. I've happily survived working from home in the last 18 months. It's been actually quite Pleasant to not be in an office where you just when you get your concentration going, someone comes along

as but don't want a balloon Interruption. So let's just pick topic on about introverts for me. But yeah, right.

Ange of writing there. And the thing is, as you've gone on and you are probably you are definitely now living more as your authentic. Self in terms of your gender has that freed up your writing of whatever will Sage writing genres. Well, a hundred percent actually saying this to my partner is the day that I think that I only came out as trans non-binary three, I mean, not I'm still in the process of doing it, you know? Take it doesn't, it's not something that happens in one sitting as its.

It takes a while to or maybe you're always coming out I suppose but I when I made that when I first said out loud, I think three years ago was when my at least my heart, my writing for adults, turned around like suddenly I was able to write in a way that I hadn't before actually which has been really interesting. I'm still still in the middle of reflecting on it. I haven't quite finished thinking about what that means that there's some kind of, you know, it's probably not that.

Difficult to Think Through just that when you start being exactly who you want to be everything else, kind of falls into place or starts falling into place anywhere, make it sound very romantic. I promise you, it's not like cycling. But, you know, I mean, well, I do and I'm sure most about lgbtiq. I+ listeners, would understand that it's not a smooth sort of limousine ride down the road. But at least you get, well, yeah, you get on the right Road, once he can be yourself and

The fact that I was going to ask you that that you know, so what you would like to say to other writers or creative / artists out there about being yourself and you probably have answered that question by saying just that your writing is expanding and hopefully coming while say more easily or more fluid fluently or fluidly, so to speak to you. If I can throw in a pan I said, I would. And that's and I just

I think it's awesome. And most of all, they are not just throwing you to personal one. Here is a nearly fifty six-year-old, transwoman to see books available that help young transgender, diverse non-binary, people get onto their authentic path earlier in life and have less stuff to go through is huge. And so, there is that deeper really powerful aspect

of the spectacular suit. That one person, one family sees this, it could be really life-changing for them, and I

I think that's that's just well. Now, it just brings a smile to my face. Saving thing even thinking about that.

Yeah, me too. I think that'd be even if yeah, like you said just one family one person that would be everything. Think that would be everything I could quit now, you know. Well, yeah you sort of yeah, I've tried. There'll be at least one. I think that's awesome. But don't quit now because we want more books more writing from you. And of course we're very fortunate here in Melbourne, and that's even in lockdown, you can order.
