When I discuss the religious discrimination Bill there, there is definitely a linkage there, and that's something that doesn't get discussed. I mean, I'll put all sort of put this in. And it's only really, you know, since since 2000, it's one of the better point that we've seen that no miracle if we're so individual messages for persevering that, we don't understand each other. There isn't that link? And so we're able to actually, you know, still from their brother, which is the, the main example that I give, but it doesn't have the types of cost.

Unless he actually gets worse than that. Well, yeah, and I mean, I'll just, if you want to discuss that now you can, but knowing what is in there. Of course, I'll raise a straw, a higher level of content note here because some of it is perhaps a little distressing, but if you want to discuss, just give it a couple more layers of teaser, go into it. Is none of it's being reported because the victims are afraid of the police because of his tree or else there or else, they're

Because it's going to have to tell a story about hooking up. It's a muscle man or something. And or they ran over there. Lizabeth, think illegal things involved like drugs, but so there's a reticence. Yeah. Look. That's a really good point. And I mean, you know, police, you know, it's an ongoing issue. I'll try to keep it neutral, but in the rainbow communities including cisgender gay men and

Trance came in and all that sort of thing and there is that fear. And of course like this time last week, there. Was it virtually to the the minute Pride March and a bunch of no police at Pride protesters jumped out in front of the police as they March down Fitzroy Street, which was you know, it is an issue and also late last year just after the last show. I did live got some messages from will say various angles on the police Town Hall.

It happened, but certainly there is that issue, but it is worried that someone can't feel they can report a crime to police. Even if we have the well, rainbow liaison offices. I'm not, I've lost track a little of the exact title, you know, sort of that exists. And so that's a real real problem that this is just beginning to go out of control to that level.

Yes, and I think that it's like it's not everyone that's involved. The perpetrators obviously know that they can do it with impunity because the same have been reported. So they can stay in your community and they just repeat it. Which it isn't something that you see outside of that. That's because that unique condition is they're not they're not being reported. Yep, and he says and it's not like a huge numbers, but it's enough bad apples in the system. Hmm.

Sort of tape, take the community. So there's there's enough of this going on and and it's like, we have to change. Okay? Bad apples to the Good Apples. They have an influence on the culture, so that it's not. Okay. Well very, very true. And I mean, let's also, you know, I think in the interest of balance, there are police who I think do their best. And, but I think when you're in a position of power and influence such as,

Police have there has to be a greater degree of responsibility and, you know, the whole Bad Apple seeing the complete phrase. It only takes one apple to stink out the whole Barrel so to speak or as one police officer, put it to me whenever you put on one of you puts on that uniform. You're representing all 13,000, sort of, have a mini up Victoria

Police. They're ours, which is a fair thing. So yes, I was actually referring to bad apples. Okay. Men who are bad apples.

What's true? Yeah, that are actually doing the crimes and there's no one within the gay community. Who's actually stopping them down and say no. No, you can't do that, but it's not. It's not that there's no moral compass being applied. Yeah, and that's, that's a huge problem. And it is worried that there is this sort of behavior going on. And there is this level of. Well, we'll say selfishness happening as well and there was another

Other thought that sort of went through, a couple of thoughts, went through my head as you were were talking there. You know, he's it. Is it a community or our is it just now for gay men and to some extent lesbians? Is it just all the level of assimilation is am in the large parts of Australia? At least is so high. That, you know, there isn't a sense of community more just individualism. There's so many good chapters in here. We could talk about. I've got it and there's quite a few. I want to mention. Let's come back to gender which of course is a

Major part of this show and there's a wonderful chapter by Ron Herzog. Tell us a bit about that one.

Well, London is, there is a gay man is amazing, mine and he has a sort of interesting story to tell and previously a Baptist Church minister. be or out as much of our authentic selves? As we want in relation to anything, including gender, identity, and gender expression and Ron seems to have found a sense of authenticity, and that's a wonderful thing which we need. You've the thing about the

Just say it's wonderful that he could actually say it. If his background I was expecting. You can actually write an essay. Hey, ho, which is an interesting dividing. The rainbow politics in our community. Brett tends more to the right or conservative end of the political / ideological Kaleidoscope. Now, let's talk a bit about that one because, you know, In fairness might be controversial and be a lot of people probably including

Listen, as if this, well, left more left station. Who would disagree with what Brett says, but he does put up reasonable arguments. Tell us a bit about that one.

Yes, I suppose we've got to accept that within. No, I think you coined the church. Me, rather Community. There's got to be a variation in political views. The political views don't come with their sexuality or gender. This is really, you know, and the political views can change the various points in their life. And so I was pleased at him. He was at prepared to do something because I thought, well, I want his view put out because there are there are people in that Community. That's that, you know, holds

Of more right-wing political views. And so it's useful to understand how they're thinking, and also, we could have right-wing governments in in office. So we could it's been a bit of an insight into how they think and what are the real important buttons for them. Well, yeah, well that that's true. I mean, you know, I think Victoria sometimes at a state level first of all, we are given that we've had labor now for all, but four of the last 23 years, you know.

Oh, it's were becoming, we can fall into the bubble trap. And then, you know, obviously well, again, referring to what's going to come up later in the program with the religious discrimination, build a national level. We certainly have a right-wing government. And it's, how on Earth do we communicate with them? Which communication, being both talking and listening in equal amounts with equal Respect by all parties. It is a challenge. So we have to start having that conversation, you know, and we

The other thing with jonghyun tap now is, can we always rely on the Alp to support us? Maybe, maybe not. We'll come to that soon. You've written lots of chapters as well. I sort of in there. Pick a cut. Anything you want to talk about that? You else, you've written about a part. You mentioned the lateral hostility amongst gay men, but mention one or two others and what they're about.

It costs a lot to maintain that and

Die pretty well, drop the sensor. When I was about the age of 50 and what happened was, this whole sex, my brain got released, and all the sudden. I had all these ideas about things. I wanted to say that came flooding through and I thought, what if I'd had that all my life. Anyway, that, that was, and that was part of this, what I call the second coming out. And I found an example in the book of a book of coming out stories as 60 something-year-old man, who basically,

Through the same process. We both became what we call a confident came in and it was it was a real turning point in my life. And I don't know whether we like, yeah, our

communities have been invisible for so long. You really only just starting to get huge numbers of the population. Going through that age, group of 50s and 60s. Yep. And I wonder how many of them need to revisit it coming out. I don't need well, look, II, totally affirm this and it's very

A parallel for me, just the you know, just change the word Gator trans and by because I sometimes say, for the first twenty nine and a half years of my life. I was going south. I was trying to be, I say joking, jokingly now a cisgender heterosexual masculine beer-drinking men's football, loving male and failing abysmally, pretty much on all counts. And so, for the next 27 years roughly, I've learned and unlearned. I've claimed my authentic self and tried to get rid of the bits, that aren't me. I'm still doing

I call this the topsoil effect coming out whether it's gender identity and or sexual / romantic orientation. I don't really, I don't want to talk for intersex status here. I think that's a very different thing in a lot of ways, but there we get through all of that. Then what about as a person? And I would say that I'm only just coming to myself totally or largely as a person now, so I very very much relate to this and what happens, what happens next. And so, I think this is

Is a huge topic for discussion and it's one that, you know, it's a nice topic to have. Once it's a nice problem to have that. Now we are getting to this because we are getting more and more people out, which is really, really welcome. So it's a wonderful book, declaring all possible bias, and interest in it, in the immortal words of a 1980s television advertisement. Where do you get it? How can we get a copy of outspoken lgbtiq, stories? Also, there is one more question before we do that.

We acknowledge that. I'm I think the only woman contributor in this and possibly the only people person perhaps other than to our knowledge, cisgender gay men. So, you know, sort of just we wanted to acknowledge that and have it and just have a bit of a mention of that. Before we go through all the, where do we get it? Yes. Well, certainly, it was my intention to sort of have a representative group of writers and I started out inviting and sort of

Hello to various people and grouped in groups. I just found that like obviously my connections are better with within gate, the game, our community. So I suppose I was

more able to be successful there, but I just wasn't getting the response, all of the commitment from other groups, and I don't know that why I don't know, because I think that the individual reasons or might have been just the time and I didn't have on the shoulders of the road people. Well, maybe because I wasn't, you know, it helps to be known and connected.

So and so I knowledge I got to deadlines and I thought I'll just going to go with it with the contributors that I have and it's a first, you know, it's a first truck path of a book like this. I do want to do another one and see how I go and I'll certainly be making an extra special effort to try and get more women, women's voices in there from range of areas. And so hopefully people will be able to see that the runs are on the board in terms of, I can't pull it together. I just

Educate them from old variety of voices for sure. Look I will give you this commitment live to air that I will gladly certainly help you promote a network. Next time. I think In fairness when you contacted me last year. Everyone was just I'll be polite and say flipping exhausted because of the damn plague, the pandemic and people were really struggling. I think we're gradually beginning to sort of poke a heads out the door again, so to speak and come back to life. So I think

Think that we will, you know, I think, next time you want to do, something will do that. And I will gladly help you network into more communities like trans and buy and where others, where I can. I will give you that commitment, very, very easily. I'm not sure if I'm an editor or not. I just, I think it's something. I'm quite skilled at doing. I see. Maybe it's an attention to detail thing. But seriously, I'll gladly assist you on that and when you want to give a call out for stories, come back on three Ciara.

We'll have a another chat about where you want to go.

I will pay consulted directly with trans and gender diverse. People parents of younger trans people or anyone like that. I was by chance at an event during Midsummer where I met with two federal, labor MP not Carnival, or pride, and managed to get a word in.
