So I'm coming through to your radio waves to people. First of all, I'll welcome Jordy.

Eight to unmute again, majority after that technical hitch and also to introduce yourself and also to to Patrick who live radio, if we could just sort of get that rolling and we will talk about the issues that hit people on campus and I welcome our two guests to the show to talk about those things.

And Patrick. First of all I'll welcome you. If I can get you two, if it's okay with you to just mention which pronoun to use and which land or lands you are on.

Hi everyone. My name is Patrick, my pronouns. Are he day? I'm coming from the lands of Windsor, people of the kulin nation and yeah, I'm the current Queen of myself for rmit University Student Union. Thanks, Patrick, and our other guest is Jordi, similar. If you could mention, which Aboriginal lands, you're on and pronouns use, if you're comfortable to mention said, pronouns, if any

I think we're having Zoom delay. Have to get used to that. It's okay. Thanks Sally. So my name is Jordi. My pronouns. Are they and them? I'm on Gabby, Gabby country, and I'm from the national Union of students as their National. Queer such a lgbtqia+ officer. Yep, all sorts of technicalities going on there, prodigies for the feedback, their listeners.

It's one of those morning's or afternoons if it's morning in Perth. Hello to our Western Australian listeners, let's get to it. Then you've got a couple of really important campaigns going, which I introduced, let's start with the one regarding recording of correct name. And also, you know, sort of pronouns that people use are very important and having gender recorded correctly. Now, sort of tell us about that one, how

Did it come about either of you if you want to jump in and tell us about that. And sort of what's, what is the, what is the current situation? What are you aiming for?

I can speak from the arm it perspective. So when I came in as the into my role, as the queen of a say, I had a few meetings, you know, hand over meetings from the previous query upset. And, you know, one of the biggest complaints that the previous clips of was working on was to stop the naming and mighty.

And I later found out that the campaign has been going on for six years, with our Mighty particular saying, oh, you know, we're working on, it will fix it soon, you know, we working on it. Currently the issue with our Mighty is that we have a system where people can put in the name and pronouns into their records, didn't just touch didn't show everywhere. So, for example, when people go to online classes usually through is through a program called collaborate, Ultra,

And collaborate Ultra on these is legal names. Picks, only legal names from the students record rather than preferred names. So yeah, that's the main issue for us. Is that the, it systems, I guess, done all mesh together and it prefer name shows in some systems, like, I know for us, it does show in emails. But then it doesn't show in online classes and the issue also goes to attendance list. I've spoken to students

Where they would come into class thinking that, you know, true name or preferred name, however, you want to say, it would be shown on the attendance list but they come into class on an on the Whiteboard doesn't attend this list of students but Orioles and it has the legal name, so that everyone can see. And they've even been like, bowling instances instances from that. Yeah, it's just horrible. Fuck this. Yeah, I, I was speaking to our campaigns officer for the

Skiing in and we had an idea to see if it's an issue that other universities, served not just an ID so that when you reached out to Jody and I guess I'll hand off to Jordan to speak what happened from there.

Guy for Jody.

Hazing. Thanks, Patrick. Yeah. So in general before coming into my role as National Clear, such as Ultra Take Care, Plus officer. I already sort of knew that dead naming was a big prevalent issue in particular with my own experiences at University where the students who I was engaged with. So, for instance, I was well and truly involved with my equate Collective and

Actually, they would always tell me the issue of like, them being dead. Time to classes and painted named in it, instead student facing platforms as well. And, like, the ongoing issue with this and why it's so important is wait. We obviously attend University for a reason. Matter of fact is just like we studied there, we pay fees. We go there to actually earn an education. And the thing is

Is is dead, naming being a prevalent issue. Doesn't really ensure a safe and good environment for us to be in. There are many people who change their names for a reason. Obviously it for those swim in the trans community, in particular like like myself. So I'm a non-binary queer person and essentially it's just appalling that universities are really not taking any action that's necessary and

I really allowing to make up excuses, like oh there's too many systems in place that can't be updated all at once, or they're not really, making the effort to give up. Give our chosen names to the relevant tutors and lecturers, or it would be like optional to give to them. So, like I think the thing is, is like, we really, like, it's so important to head into this campaign and

Is this ongoing issue? Like I said, it really jeopardizes the well-being of students. And on campuses, it really creates an environment where they don't feel comfortable to come on campus or engage in their classes. And it's even daunting on people to come out to class like their classroom lecturers and tutors as well. And say, hey, this isn't my name. This is what I go by Dan now. Basically and so yeah, this campaign is so important that we need

To be really like and I'm really glad like, Patrick reached out to me because it was an issue. I really passionate about and wanted to address as well. And that's why we've been collectively trying to engage with as many University students as possible and really want to try and send a loud. Clear message to universities that they need to do

better, they have a duty of care, and responsibility to their students, and students need to feel safe on campus. So yeah, feel safe and be safe and I'm glad you raised that.

This is, you know, other people, I mean, content note Family Violence. You know, people who are survivors of Family Violence might have needed to change their names past sex workers who have faced stigma and now, which is unfair. Totally, the fault of SEC of sex worker phobia but there's many, many others as well. Also, it could be people, you know, it is their call if they have a name that might be hard to pronounce or something and they want to change it to make it easier if

The family name, all those sorts of things and people from overseas, where they can't go and go back to their births deaths and marriages or equivalent in their country or region, or whatever. Because of lots of reasons, Wars queer, phobia anything or combinations of above solidarity to quiz in the Ukraine. Also just one example, lots and lots of reasons, so it's a really important thing. But I have to say, you've brought back a memory from said, the old took in a pan who did a degree at Melbourne University.

Diversity of Melbourne in the mid-80s. And when I firmed my gender identity in 98, I whilst I was able to get at a small pun intended on a serious matter, a transcript of results within my new name, some crusty sale mail said, oh no, you've got to keep your degree or parchment in your original name and it's like, well, how can I can't show that anywhere? Now, I can't look at it and for lots of trans people, you know, the past name is incredibly triggering.

Upsetting, I believe that has moved on to some extent, but there's still work to do, but it's no excuse that there's multiple systems. I mean, people are more important than it and anything else in all site, I have to send my empathy to Patrick six years, and it's still her barely progressing. That's, well, not acceptable to put it politely. So, it is really important than that. What can what are you asking? You know, will say people on each University campus to do

But for those who are not on campus, is there any way we can be the proverbial allies to this campaign as well? And then we'll move on to your other Campaign, which is equally as important.

I'm Audrey, if you want to jump in,

I don't think we really specifically focus too much on how like out attention has specifically been on like Quay offices on campuses and presidents with the relevant student unions. But I do think it is important that when you do see an issue that pops up or someone does disclose that they're not having the best day mental. Health wise to consuming dead babe on campus. I think the best way. A now I can be there is to listen to them.

Firm them and be there to ensure that like look this might be the case. But to me, you always this person, you know, like yeah you you are who you are. Like validation is such a big point of a like ship you know like being there in the moment and being there for them. I think I think it's well I could just raising a general issue. If people did want to like they could easily enough try and look up the like

Like the teachers of the vice Chancellor, for instance, of the university and specifically say hi. Like I think this is a really important issue that you need to address. It is clear that this has been prevalent and University campuses and we need to make sure the well-being and safety of shake Uriah plus students is well and truly protected and then maybe also see like get a confirmation from them as well just

To see what they're doing to protect like the rights of trans students, you know, all those who essentially aren't transport do change their name because like you said Sally, there's a lot there, there is a lot of trauma, with the name, like, with names and people can change it. But due to, for instance, experiencing Family, Violence, you know. And like it's so important that universities do be safe spaces for all, you know, or like do become that.

Yeah, I think that's my main. Take on the matter with really trying to have an open letter that just gently says to the University's, you need to do better and we like more widely and this goes into the later Campaign, which we'll discuss later Valley, but there will be a specific point and which like a petition that people can engage and support and say this is it on for instance.

And this it discusses the issue date naming sir. Yeah, I'll pass it on to Patrick if you have anything else as well,

Yeah, I can say from the rmit perspective as I said, for us, the main issue was the student facing platforms. Different it systems not integrating together. So, when I regionally came into this campaign, I mean, though it was and it still is from, from the MIT perspective is to get the it systems to be integrated. So when students students with their preferred name at the system, it shows everywhere not just on the emails. Well, you know, in online classes in

In other programs, we have like a job search program that also has been named people like,

Some some in some spaces is doesn't that name in some? It does and we just wanted to be integrated so it doesn't. But when I came into this campaign, as Jodi mentioned, we reached out to every clear of said in basic, almost every officer in every University if we couldn't reach out to Korea. So we reach out to the Presidents of this Cheney unions and see. And just ask that, is this an issue at your University as well. And, and at most universities,

It is also an issue on, she'll be facing problems, just like an ID. So they also get Nate that named on, maybe not online classes of cars, but they might get their name gone emails on something else. So it is an IP issue as well. But there is just in general, the naming issue of we've heard from the people, where students just

Students have just professors but just refused and use their real names for example. So we sort of went from this more Niche issue of just it systems that many people to just make it a more broad 12 just universities need to respect people's chosen names and pronouns. So as Jodi mentioned, we're currently in the process of writing like an open letter that obviously me Jodi and then

Not going to ask query officers as well, around Australia, to co-sign it. It's going to be addressed to different universities, different Vice chancellors, Etc. Just to say, you know, universities, you know, have a problem that naming this is where the problems are and you really need to fix it, you know, ASAP basically. Yeah, now look, certainly

keep us in the loop on that one and will promote, you know, if I 3cr and other means and I

Have a couple of thoughts that maybe University alumni could write to their Chancellor in the meantime, and then also turn this into the letter into a petition and people could sign that. Also, I think this is one given the systemic nature, I'd perhaps, it's one for Australian Human Rights Commission or something like that. Maybe they need to flex a bit of muscle. I know they're under resource but you know, maybe get them on side as well. But it is part of a general safety on campus for questions. And that's

The Campaign, which is equally important run into some detail on that what sort of issues, you know, sort of going on for quiz on campus? I mean as I say aye I was at Uni way back in the 80s. So I don't really know you've touched on one. What are some of the others across the lgbtiq? A plus, communities kaleidoscope.

Yeah, thanks Allie. And I'm like, I think we'll definitely take those suggestions to mind as well. We like with the dead naming as issue as well. But bring, we're hoping to do a report to get a better Sous Australia, which is the peak representative body for universities. So we're really trying to bring the attention to them as well to, at least, bring some guidelines in out. So the campaign you mention widely, what it's called, it's an nus queer, such a particular class Department campaign,

Color Dad. No question left behind and obviously with the title of that, it obviously essentially means no, like, no question should be like behind, you know, we have like this seven key to man. So to specifically that address on Australian government level and then five that are more specific to University Center Admiral. Basically, so more broadly, one of them is calling for a

A legislative Trudy of Care on a federal level for the University sector. Just to ensure protection of queer, such OT, q r+ students rights that universities. So, this is just to ensure that universities basically have an obligation. They're just ensure that their campuses are safe for students and have a consistent approach to the welfare. Well-being, and pastoral care for struggling students and basically if they're failing to do so just breaching this.

Pretty much the university should be held accountable. So many universities currently have ongoing issues where they don't have extent accessible gender-neutral bathrooms available on campus which we're hoping call out. We Harbor Key to man called we all need to pay and really we're going to make sure that essentially universities stop using the excuse that ought there. Are these toilets available they're just disabled

Toilets and as like and basically the thing is is obviously disabled tall and so more specifically to meet the needs of the disabled Community. As someone who liked identifies, with in the disabled Community, like I really have a bit of a hesitation of using the toilet because I'm just like, yes it's gender neutral. But matter of fact is is I feel like someone who is like if I'm using that space and a disabled

It needs to desperately need to use it, then it's obviously an ongoing issue, you know? So we really want to make sure that those are available and essentially provide an awareness that universities need to make sure that students aren't judged for what taught that use for instance or like, essentially making sure that they feel safe to use whichever toilet. They need to, you know, that the my records, my rights aspect of it is addressing the whole debt naming issue.

Here, as we previously discussed, just essentially making sure that University's campuses allow queer Specialty Care Plus students to it just easily change their records to reflect that name gender and pronouns. So essentially what's the go is as we've discussed as many issues where is dead naming and biscuit, misgendering that occurs on campuses and we want to make sure that universe is essentially take action.

And make sure that this doesn't happen and make sure that really realistically. Hopefully, the universe is can have sort of like some sort of streamlined approach that pretty much if you update your data's that goes up to like pretty much changes everything, you know. Yeah. Mental health is obviously big issue with increased social Shaker + Community as well. We're like like we're disproportionately impacted by Mental Health.

With more likely to like experience, depression and anxiety, and more likely to like like with high suicide rates as well. And essentially, we're calling on for the University's to at least happen lgbtqia+ counselor on campus as well. So, this is just just specifically

having someone who's trained and equipped with the tools to support quiz Specialty Care Plus students because

Like with the many she says we mentioned we dead naming and missed rendering Etc. Students are actually not accessing the services that they need to at University because they have the fear that this will happen to that. You know. And we want to make sure that they're supported as much as possible in general. We want universe is to take a stand against any queer phobic teachings that are happening at University as well. No student should be going to any class Workshop tutor.

A or whatever and basically just feel the discomfort of being who they are, you know, or like having to feel sick suddenly sick to see content but really that discriminates against them and using like the wrong terminology or promoting the incorrect theories. There are really what universities to try and just stand up say they like this is not on to happen and really create like a more setting environment for students.

Feel safe in there, like in the area of fields that they are very keen to study, you know. Yeah. And then our last one is obviously making sure that there's a safe space on campus so many universities. Do you have a safe space on campus for questions? Which is great the ongoing issues like because more people likely now to come out at University which is obviously a great thing. These faces are now a lot smaller too.

To accommodate the needs of students who kind of feel like they detox is the safe space available. And they are also ongoing issues about accessibility as well. So, like, and there's a big intersection between the queer community and the disabled Community obviously. So we obviously want to make sure these spaces are as accessible and safe. And that universe is really do. Listen and try to be like, okay, yes you need this, let's put you in this area, Etc, and whatnot. So that

What the sums up, what that campaigns about, basically all with the demands and there's like a petition, I'll be coming out, will be literally the working to, they send trying to like Lobby universities to change their methods and sort of bringing a lot of media attention towards, like the duty of care aspect, making sure it's really important. So yeah.

That kind of just that I've spoken quite a bit a bit. Sorry about that. Sorry. Let's all right. Um, You just have to wrap it up at this point. So how can people stay in touch with you? I would also suggest writing directly to State and Commonwealth ministers, perhaps with a link to this episode, that sounds like a fair thing as well, you know, let's get some action.

A little bit about yourself and your role as commissioner for the lgbtq+ community. So my name is Todd Fernando and I have the pleasure of being the Victorian, commissioner for lgbtq plus communities. I grew up on country on my country.

Ratray country, which is now known as central New South Wales. I had the privilege of going up on country and learning my old people's ways, which was lovely. I completed my PhD in medical anthropology and work in the research base for quite some time. Before. I was tapped on the shoulder to step into this role, which has been a dream come true. If I'm being completely honest being able to work for our people, in the most various ways has been a gift, keeps me getting up every morning knowing that we're Shifting the compass when it comes to, you know, really secure.

During the rights both legally and culturally and socially for different types of lgbtq plus people including mobs. And, you know, both Aboriginal and First Nations people here and finally across the Pacific. So it's been really lovely. The big question is to covid-19 and how that's impacted and your perspective queer communities and to clear the first nation mob. And from what, you know, Pacifica, it's been one of those things that has been really devastating for our communities but more so it has

You know, I think one of the biggest impacts for First Nations and for Pacific communities across Victoria and indeed Australian and obviously the world I think part of the reason why it's been so devastating for us in particular, is because being culture.

First family is part of who we are and being able to connect with family or far new. In that way, was very limiting that aspect of not being able to connect and continually be around. The mold has had some really devastating consequences.

For our people and certainly, you know, it's not the first time in our histories that we've encountered disease and these types of things that have come from elsewhere. And if I think about the historical nature of from smallpox to covid, for First Nations, people globally, it's just another thing that we've had to endure an encounter, as a result of colonization, it did show us just how important our ways of knowing and being were, you know, we locked out our communities and we were able to

To safeguard them as well, because we knew just how much that protection was there. But again, it was very limiting in terms of being able to connect to each other. How important do you think it is for people to remain Vigilant and being safe from covid-19 and all its variants? One of the things that I think is really important is the health messaging that we've learned over the last few years and and how we can Implement those messaging and those guidelines in other areas. But again, it's just making sure that we're protecting ourselves.

And in turn we then protect our family and family just to add it is actually 3 CR. It's the radio van. So I just wanted to know if you had a quick message about that. Yeah. Support absolutely. It's not every day that we get to hear people who look like us and sound like us on radio. Wonderful speaker to you've got a whanau and this very special episode Todd. Fernando, commissioner of the Igbtqa+ communities in Victoria. Thank you for having me some

I've won three backstroke, three breaststroke and three freestyle. Plus the two individual medleys. In this competition talking about the competition. Sally, can you tell us about some of

Of your competitors. Well, look Bruce, I don't really focus on the competition, the I just focus on trying to do my best and keep building myself and so I didn't really think too much about the competition. I didn't really see them that much either, so to speak.

Exactly. How many competitors did you have in each race? Sally.

Well, to be honest, Bruce, there weren't any other competitors, you know, it's a bit disappointing. I mean, after Fina has been so quick to get this together after 10 years. This being the first ever open section at the Olympics. I would have thought there were more, but anyway, girl's got to do what a girl's got to do. Hey, absolutely Sally. You must be so excited. What do you think will happen next? Well, look Bruce on. Sure, that prime minister.

We'll give me a reception at Parliament House. He's always been a supporter of the lgbtqa+ communities.
