A story is really like it's not all roses. Along the way we certainly had our fair share of what unfortunately we turn transphobia. Mmm. So we highlight that

There's a number of issues that are rise throughout the documentary and I think it's really important that people. Yes, it's a beautiful love story. Please watch it for that, but please watch it so that you can see what we actually go through and everyday life. And what I had to do to get married is really important. Yeah. So for me, I think it's really important to obviously share a story of an older person.

And I'm thinking myself old, of course, but one of the things too is, is wonderful. Land of Australia is a Federation of States. So each state has their own particular rules about certain things, say too much because it's hopefully that part got into the documentary, but there were some hurdles that go had to jump through that.

Because she was born in a particular State, I didn't have to. So, there is a stark difference because we're a federation, each State's, make their own rules about certain things. So, even after marriage, equality was passed, we couldn't get married. Yeah, I think that's you've highlighted something really good there and I think I'll, I think I'm going to take a guess, but marriage equality was also getting that federal law in December.

2017, obviously removed and major barrier to couples other than M on one birth certificate. F on the other getting married and having marriage is recognized. But then we the some states and territories had to get rid of laws that got rid of what was called used to colloquially. Call forced divorce, that sort of thing. Yeah, no a big barrier and then finally all of them, some had it done beforehand but some had needed the federal law.

I think it's very very important that another thing that pushed me and you know to embrace this project and I still feel either when I when I hear talking about all these important things that we all have been saying it's like this is a story also about diversity in general. There is something that connects me with Kayla Lisette in a way because at this stage of my life, I am

I was born in Chile. My parents are Italian, and I am also strengthen. And, you know, when I meet people in the street, even when bad things happen people, while ago, I was on the tram and I was saying something to a woman that was screaming against to a young boy, that was in the tram doing something that, you know, he was just, he was just moving too much and she starts bringing against him, and I say her,

Hey mom, so, you know, relax, he wasn't doing anything wrong and she said to me, go back where you are from, you are not Australia and you don't have a say and I was like, sorry, I have an Australian passport. Yeah, I am Australian and you are something with this little story. What I mean is like because I've been living in different places and my identity is pretty Floyd. I don't like it when people guess who I am, or what I am, or where I come from,

Light and they put labels on me, we get it. Is that I think this is one of the of the first things that I felt when I was talking with them. The pressure. They hold their entire life. They had about, you know, this Society telling them who they are. You are, you are a man, you have to do this, you have to get married, you have to do this this and that

while they were not feeling comfortable with the label that Society was putting on them. Of course, name.

Impact on gay lizard is and their lives is much stronger than probably what I had in sense, in, especially in the mental health space. But what I think is like, this is a story about also diversity. And the need to stress that, you know, we don't need labels anymore and it would be great if people would allow us to Define ourselves and let it let us be. And you know, I would I would love that people in the future even

Younger Generations that probably, they are having more space, especially with the transgender identity.

They more and more are able to live their lives as they really are. Well Gail is that unfortunately you know they couldn't and and I think this is this is something that is worth to to share as well as a message of this documentary. And that's why I think it's a it's a story of two women that have lived an entire life. And now they decided to share this story and it's going to be very useful for all of us also to
