But I'm going to get I'm going to say this because I was doing I'll get it out of the way for I like to say all labels are valid a middle-aged choking a panel at myself to see someone who is now 15, just out there rocking it and I've got to say look and glamour as well. Thank you just it's a cathartic thing for someone of my era and you're just you know you cooking along with your life.

Life tell us more though. About what you're doing is part of Midsummer because you've got some very special today that is because you've got some very special things happening. Yeah. So I started off the day, doing the uncle jack tribute, which was very, very exciting. It was a very good experience because he did Welcome to Country on the go, shoot Street stage last year. So it's, it's an honor to be on the same stage as him. And yeah, now I'm here and I'm going to go and MC the Smith Street stage after this all. Look. Absolutely. And

I will just connect that into the wonderful acknowledgement that we just heard played recorded by 3 CR, some fabulous quietly behind the scenes team doing so much make yely who I just want to thank right off the bat for all of the great work. They have put in to putting this together as part of all of the 3 CR team who just do so much. But on the point I mean it is so important that we acknowledge that rainbow communities are intersectional and diverse. And I just

Love the connection there between. You know, what you've just said about acknowledging Uncle Jack Charles. Who, of course, was just such a legend. Yeah, yeah. So your name. See, now I've somebody sits behind a microphone. You could say, I've been in, say, you know, sort of totally. What did you did you have this yearning to beat him? Seems it just something that came from Deep with him? Well I mean I had the honor of being able to MC Uncle Jack show and I with Uncle Jack for the last six years. And it started off with me just giving the trigger warning about.

Insane already words and then it kind of progressed from that and I really enjoy it. So yeah, yeah, look at these fun. It brings things together and uses that skill which is sort of so important and you're here you are just you know, I know it's maybe cliched but you're out and proud in so many ways which is so awesome. And, you know, showing your skills as a whole person in conjunction with your sense of identity, which is sort of what we're always.

Laughter? Yeah, yeah. And we've also got a thank you. I'm Patrice. Thank you. Mom far away and his family and support. Yeah. Who it, who are here, who helped arrange things. Yeah. And you know, you mentioned as we were chatting, just before we went live to air that you're at a very supportive school. Well, I'm trans and queer people which is, of course, important that you get that Foundation to build on, yeah, life rolling. Can you tell us a little more about sort of what they've done to be?

Supportive for you and we use. I mean I'm very fortunate to be at that school. I think the biggest thing that they've done to help me which I found very helpful was just to take it in baby steps. So when I want to change my name on the road of being able to do that, change, my pronouns and come out publicly. I think they've just been a really good help and in that sense and I think it's been great. Yeah. Yep. Absolutely. And so that sort of culture and that direction and Leadership has been helpful and

Sort of people in your particular class and year. How can I ask? How that's gone. I don't I haven't had that many like issues. I think everyone is just being really great about it. I think most people at that school are queer, which is pretty cool. So there are many issues. Look at his eyes, it is a happy joy to hear that when I hear schools around now, where it's like this more queer kids than cisgender heterosexual and presumably in do sex. It's like there's so many, it's Utopia.

And it seriously is good and cathodic that we have that happening. Yeah. And you know sort of your you do. Lots of stuff you've been doing some short films as well. Yeah, I have, I mean, this was kind of a for covid. I did heaps of acting and stuff, which was really fun, but, yeah, I think after covid. It's been a little hard to get back into it but yeah, baby steps. Well, look, things, do seem to be coming back at me. I've been to some packed live music Geeks over the summer, where it's just been

Sellouts and touring artists are coming through, you know, sort of, in there having to put on extra shows now because of the demand, and everybody just wants to party. Everyone wants to just get to will say, as usual a life as possible, we acknowledge that there are people who are immunocompromised and may not be able to do that. Now, hearts are still very much with them as well, but you know, sort of tells us a little more about the acting what sort of styles of you done.

Did it. I mainly doing hip to film and TV, I'm doing a little bit of theater. I'm studying their studies at school at the moment, which is really interesting. I mean, it's very different, but I enjoy. Yeah, well, that's the thing in. Look, I'm going to ask the really important question. You're happy doing it very happy. It's in something that I want to do in the future I can. Well that's that is so much the main thing, you know, that you have that happiness and are able to have that Joy.

Joy, which is sort of what we always wanted for our communities because it just gives us that sense of thriving and achieving our full potential which is every humans, right? Yeah. And you know you've it's great that your school is on board we know sadly sometimes that's not always the case and for young queer and trans people of all intersections and diversities. You know what would you like to say to them perhaps and you know if it's not going as well? I mean,

I am only 15 so do what you want with this information, but I'd say like the biggest thing that I'm focusing on at the moment, is, I mean, it's a hard thing to do, but I think when you do it, you do notice a big difference is trying to surround yourself with people who, you know, will love and accept you for you. And I mean, there's great events that are put on with Midsummer Vic Pride - 18 that kind of nurture, those kind of friendships for people who will love and accept you. So I think it's really important to just put all your time.

And energy into people who, you know, will have your back at the end of the day? Well, that's the thing, it's good to have those supports around you and I a tip that I learned from one of the pioneering rainbow Educators in this country, fabulous, Daniel, Woodhouse, sort of have at least five people as the proverbial safety net behind you. So if something does go off balance

going on with this little wobbles a bit and they're underneath. And you can get you sort of grounded again, really? Really quickly. Yeah.

And look, anything else. You just like to say about Midsummer life, philosophy, acted. I mean, I'm very grateful to be here today. I think it's such an amazing event. But yeah, I think that's it. Look, I think it is. And I think, you know that whilst we acknowledge that this until until there is absolutely zero discrimination in any form. We've got to keep going, but here we are, you know, outside, you know, in Melbourne /

Nam, you know, celebrating queerness celebrating diversity. Where is of course. As again, as per the introduction, we know there are lots of places in the world that can't do that. Yeah. It does give a boost, you know, and that's know whether it's to do with gender or whatever it is, it just makes such a big difference. So you've got three stores were. Whoo, yes, yes. So we're very fortunate that people keep donating and that's what keeps the program alive that we can travel around the state and offer.

Vents are and when we have an event you're welcome to come along and bring donations, but you don't need to make donations to be able to take things from the clothing swap. So it's all available to you because that's been donated by so many people. We also have a donation point in Bendigo, which is the Bendigo neighborhood Hub. So, if you look at the Bendigo neighborhood Hub, you're welcome to drop in donations to that venue to awesome. Now, the thing is, you said you aren't based in Regional

Tory or and that leads to question itself. We're about to be done clothing swaps, you know, physically around around the state. Well, last weekend or two weekends ago, we were in maryborough, but we've been over to shepperton, we've been to wear a be. We've been to. Where else have we been? We you're the you're the translator, right? Leyland siblings. You've been or what?

Sort of what was it? We've been everywhere. You know, in everywhere. He's who sang that song? Lucky Star. There's some intergenerational learning for everyone, listeners of all genders. And, you know, it is really important that people get that chance. Because one of the things that we know is that whilst here we are in so-called in a Melbourne, where things are, you know, I think by touched on in the last chat that I had with Frankie the, you know, it's a pretty good place to be queer although there's always room to improve.

We know that there can be disparity, sometimes between Metro and Regional / rural areas and what are the things that you sometimes? See that? Perhaps where there's things where if you had the magic wand you would do dot dot. Yeah, I guess for us a big part of what our group do is social connection and and enabling people to meet with with community and other people like them because it's very isolating when you're in a regional rural town. And you feel like you're the only

Only person with that Identity or with that life experience. So when we get out to those, there's there's more Regional towns, we engage with people and hear from them about. I've never met another trans person or I haven't had the opportunity to express myself in this this space so freely and and it's really empowering for them all. Look. Absolutely. You know, look, I mean and you know, it sort of took just took me back about. Where are we now to nearly 28 years? I mean, I,

And hadn't met a trans person until into my 30th year of physical living. And all of a sudden, it's like, oh, I'm not this in inverted. Commas strange person, or whatever. I'm just a person who has one part happens to be trans and it's like, oh, yippee and this, oh gosh, it's brought me back the sense of buzz. When I went to my first meeting at Sea Horse, way back in 1995, and it's like, oh, suddenly this relatively quite personal that you wouldn't think. So now sit me speaking into a microphone.

He's really is a bit more confident and assertive and all those sorts of things. Oh I could totally relate to that. Yes. I my history was video production. So I was hidden behind the camera behind the scenes, but never in front of the camera and never speaking on radio. And so, it's been a bit of a journey. Yeah, yeah. And you know, sort of, I mention there's been well, UPS downs and non-binary in-betweens. But yeah. Sort of, I might just ask them. This is really off the cuff. What sort of things got you through?

The the tricky times the pot and got you past the potholes in the road, or I guess that's why I'm so passionate about connecting people, because that is absolutely what got me through. So, when I came out, I lost all the, I guess. Key people in my life that I thought I had Safety and Security with. And so, as I very quickly became very isolated and alone. But as I started to engage with the

Queer Community, but more importantly, the trans community and people with similar experiences to my own then I started to feel like a real sense of community and when I got back that sense of Safety and Security in myself and my confidence, all of that started boosting by all those people who saw me for who I am. Yep, you are being authentic, they could see that and it helped connect which is so important. Yeah, it is just so important to have that safety net and I know

Knowledge, any sadness and feelings of loss that, you know, you lost people from the first part of your life. That, you know, and it happens and I will also say that if anything we discuss on the show is perhaps upsetting and you need to reach out. Remember, of course, there is the fabulous, switchboard in cute, it including Q Life in or Q Life with including switchboard in Victoria and Tasmania on 1, 800 1845 27. Please reach out if you ever need support on that around.

Of course, one of the things that comes up sometimes is there was a great session on this at The Stand By Us conference last September entitled The by the non-binary in the wardrobe. And it's, what is a non-binary wardrobe. Yeah, it's sort of like, do we have to create one in a society? That's

And a have gender in our in our clothing Swap, all the racks are just clothes hanging available for you to explore and you know you don't even have to be trans because some people who just wear the same clothes or the same color, they don't feel confident to go into a store and try things on or spend money on something that's a little bit different to what they normally wear. So, yeah, in the clothing swap, it's an opportunity for all people to try something new and it might be a different color or it might be different.

Don't type of clothing, or a different style or a different cut. So, it's free to to explore. Yep. No, look at. Absolutely, that's why I like the for the so much in that. I love the way that you haven't really classify them by gender, but maybe of just, I don't know called it slacks, skirts, whatever. That why hello department stores and others. A song and the video for that is inspired by Bob Fosse and it's slightly Niche, but I'm very proud of it. So I will plug that as well wherever possible. We also made the video for somehow ourselves and then we've been working on some more so you should be seeing some more

songs, very soon depending on when we get everything together for them. But we do have them and we're like absolutely dying to get them out there. So it will be very

Very soon. Excellent. Well, we'll look forward to that. As I said, please access 3 CR. And of course, there's lots of, you know, lots of great Community media that support queer and Grassroots artists of all genres and so, they're there. And I mean, we love Community media. Yes, I'm obviously a longtime broadcaster of 3 CR but I acknowledge all the great work by don't done by Community stations and media programs to on all of them to

Grass Roots Music could get the proverbial bernzy. So that's really just so fan. So please and that's to cry club and to all of up-and-coming, Grassroots artists get us your stuff. So we can support you because it's hashtag community. And are you part of the mid summering? Sorry, yes. You're part of the midsummer in tonight. We covered covered that, the street party in, which is really excellent, and it's just great to see.

See that diversity. I mean, you know there's all forms of artistic diversity within the queer community of course, whether it's bubblegum pop or whether it's drag queens, or whether it's Visual Arts. Because, of course, queer people are at least equally as amazingly talented as the broader Community. But maybe more, so because we push past artificial barriers. Oh, yeah. And there are sort of I just, I just think it's great that you're out there. How many people in the band? We should ask to it, doesn't it?

And my best friend in the whole world undertook. He is a genius, a wizard. I have no idea what he can do with that guitar and somehow he does, everything, he is like, definitely like the brains and the brawn. Are you looking a bit Butch there proudly? I'm the verge of Brawn but, um, yeah, it's the two of us and then we do have like, a live drummer who helps us out at shows, em.

M, who is also insanely talented? And yeah, we just managed to make a lot of big noise with it. Just being a couple people but yeah, we're really lucky. We have absolute best friends and yeah, it's almost too easy. I think to work together, and yeah, I think I'm extremely extremely lucky, to have, you know, all that, that's awesome. That there is just that, I'm sorry. It's another wrestling reference in ring

We'll take that out as we move over to James and in your face for 1:00. So, I'll just sort of keep chatting for a few minutes and James has a great range of

Guests. I can see one of the great people in our community all ready to rock very soon. The Fabulous Allison Thorne is here which is always awesome and such a great supporter of 3 CR and out quip and our programming and our queer programming. DJ mon Franco's going to be there, poor kid talking HIV and his area of expertise and and more will do a teaser they're picked finally coming up at 2:00. Great to have them as part of the now.

Now alarm locked into the the 3 CR quid broadcasting team usually on Saturday afternoons but an extra show this week and then clearing the air as usual at 3:00 as part of our fantastic lineup here from Street party. It has just been so awesome to have. And there's some course, look out for things coming up in the community for polyamorous people. Polly big discussion group is on this Tuesday, and well, might be a face for radio, but

Heading over to Adelaide for better together this weekend. And so I have all the news from that next week on out of the pan. But I'm just going to see if we've got somehow ready to rock and if we've got ready to go with it. Now then I think we'll close it there. Heather, you can, what is it? You're able to do it without moving your lips. So let's get our eardrums ready and I'll take it out. It's so good to be back doing out of the pan after a very relaxing summer once again, I just want to thank all the 3 CR.

Are you say behind the scenes? Team for the amazing effort, they put in. They just do such an amazing job, and it's just such an integral part of 3 CR, and we never hear it. We never hear them, but they are definitely there in skillful spirit. And so I think on that note, we'll take it out from out of the pan for the first one back with somehow, thanks for tuning in to out of the pan.
