Exception is needed two weeks yesterday. 13 days to go before we vote in the referendum, in regarding to the voice and no, I'm neither Aboriginal or Torres Strait. Islander I totally acknowledge my privilege in that area that I'm white will say 99% Anglo-Saxon, or

Those sorts of things, totally, but I am someone who's experienced discrimination stigma. Similar will say negativity, for parts of my identity, and I'd like to believe I'm a very empathic person and in that sense, kindness, I try to live as hard as I can. I'm not perfect, but I try at least 50.1% to live by my personal motto. Ask yourself every day is both what you are doing and how you are doing.

It coming from a place of kindness and in that sense, I will be voting. Yes. Saturday week for the voice. I feel that, you know, we've obviously treated our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples on this big island and most of the surrounding smaller ones. Very, very poorly. Can we change the past? No, can we try to make up for it? Yes, if you make a mistake, you admit it fix it. Learn from it, proved try to prevent it happening again. I think.

It's really, really important to do. And you know, look, I know I'm sure I've made mistakes on race skin color Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island. I'm the first to admit that that it maybe I haven't looked at the overall level of privilege, I have and we can all I think look intersectionally at our privilege and do that. Well, I think that when we do that, we will really have to go for a yes, vote.

Are some arguments I have, in terms of the night case, some would say, would a treaty be better. Well, I honestly think it would. But the thing is, if we don't get the voice, now, I don't think we'd get the treaty in the thing is getting a voice. Perhaps would help us move to a treaty. So, is it a 100% or nothing? Vote for, yes, probably not. But, is it about 95 or 98 percent? Definitely? And I think that's the main thing. No voters racists, possibly not

I think there are people who are being, unfortunately, do not listening to some of the inaccurate information. That is very emotive, kalin's popped in and said that she will also be voting. Yes. Thank you Kaylee. Yeah, I think there's a sort of, has been a lot of fear-mongering. And you think about from our point of view in the lgbtqia+ communities, particularly gay and lesbian, what happened in 2017, during the marriage equality postal,

It was a lot of fear-mongering and you know, it's simply not on, you know, we've got to try to look at this from the place in our heart that is kindness to use our rationality and I think we need to do that and I hope that my little bit here, you know, is one drop in the ocean that just can make a difference. As I say, you know, what is it? I'm not Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander. But the thing that I always asked,

It's someone who is trans and buy a neurodivergent people, listen and try to understand and I think if we listen to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices, then we will understand that I think the vast majority of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait. Islander people would want us to vote. Yes. And we need to listen to those voices and then that will enable will say a bigger voice, that could move things forward more and in a better Direction and help

All the playing field. So to speak, you know, increase equity and justice for Aboriginal, and Torres Strait Islander people. So back to have, you, welcome your thoughts on that. Jenny's popped in some thoughts.

Thoughts on Dan Andrews, resignation Jenny, Bean from Sydney and just saw the love-hate with him as a leader, was he in our life for our community? So yeah, he certainly was love-hate. I mean through the somewhat emotive one. I think hi,

We emotive time. That was 20, 20 and 21 in the pandemic and Dan went for the same or it most intense lockdowns or relatively intense, in terms of the eight states and territories around Australia. Now has probably made the job easier a bit, which, from the point of the queer communities is great. I mean, you look at the list of reforms that have happened, you know, that from a trans point of view, the birth certificate.

Which are very high standard and look, there's still the potential to get them up to the Tasmania and Queensland Australian proverbial, gold standard. And the only reason they couldn't that couldn't happen in 2019 was under the state constitution legislation that where there is an impasse between the two houses of Parliament has to be reintroduced in Pretty in the same format and there was only one Amendment because marriage, equality had

Being a cheap. So we didn't need to talk about forced divorce. We had to go with that. So we didn't get that high standard at the time, but you look at the funding that's been given to Rainbow communities. You look at the support the drag, then, you know, having a drag queen in state Parliament. While all the drag queen story time events were under attack, those sorts of things, I think are good. There are some, who say it could be better. Some who say it's performative, you know,

I think there's at least a solid enough record to back it up, is my honest opinion. So there's my well 22 cents worth for what it's worth and with GST and inflation, welcome everyone else's thoughts. And I think that, you know, if you I think there's more likelihood that people who have been through tough stuff because of who they are, we'll probably, you know,

Be more likely, I think to have empathy for the voice. In this case, welcome everyone's thoughts on this as long as they're polite and Jenny's come in right now. Sadly with high living costs, some Australians are not really engaged switched off and that includes our own Community. Well, yes, some certainly have. We have unconscious biases. We don't see enough diversity evening. Queer activist circles. Yes. So I'm agree with that one, too. Still lots of
