So, you know everything on fabric. He was a really nice way to exhibit so it's softened and it's really reactive. Yeah walked past it.

It's amazement, but it's almost animated. I'm tempted to wear it as a cape do really beautiful. Yeah. Well, I mean you touch on Mental Health there and I mean as part of diversity and

intersectionality eaten your career and neurodivergent as well, you know sort of it must feel a great sense of in every sense of the word pride that all those things will just say a part of you

And you know just that you're able to use them to create things which is really cool. It's like I like the kind of comes out of my head. Yeah, so I'm just a bit nervous. So I'm struggling to talk a little bit. That's quite look that's quite all right, beautifully said, I must say you're very welcome. It's just sometimes it's hard to have when you're not having a good time.

I was going to bring up my head some plans to I was tossing up whether to bring it up today and I suppose now it because you've asked about impact on Mardi Gras. I think we need to bring these issues in I am very very very dot dot a million times very aware of the emotive nature of police and queer and diverse and marginalized communities and it's been a very impulsive a emotional time for the last wearing now three weeks since the

Events at Pride March and even you could say five weeks given that there was some incidents at carnival. I don't think I think the first time you know, I think we've got all try to I'm just going to try and throw information in having had negative experiences of of All Sorts with police neurodivergent experiences. What a queer phobic experiences over time. Yeah. Look I totally get that and I get that there.

People worse off than me who have various forms of privileged white. I'm going to l'm going to call middle class passing not Aboriginal not Torres Strait Islander very and those sorts of privileges but is one issue there's but I just I don't know I question whether turning over tables at Midsummer carnival stalls is really going to do anything.

Nothing positive. Some people say I would be a shame if police didn't March in Pride and or Mardi Gras given that things have changed. I think we've got to remember that. There's been an unequal shift in relationships with police if we're just talking lgbtiq a lesbian and gay would have progressed further. I'm not going to comment for intersex or Ace here. I'm not sure if there are specific issues with police. It's

My sense of identity be interested to hear of people think they are by people. I'm not I know there could be issues there. I'm aware though of groups that are further down the line like trans and polyamory where perhaps people haven't had such good responses from police sex workers have had issues in the past. I believe things have improved in the last four or five years, but you know, I think that's

Something we keep in mind. We can't look at our rainbow as homogeneous in that sense. Now look the other side of the coin and this is going to be a little controversial but I'm only going to put the thought in there. I was talking to someone who by any counts would pass as a cyst or not pass would you know would think would you think would be your middle class cisgender man? And he said well if police I won't fight you

His words but if police sometimes use power in ways that could seem excessive or unfair can they complain if people you know sort of push back at the against them now, I honestly personally I don't believe throwing paint at anyone has caused problems and I've heard stories of police and families and who was scared. There was someone a young person at their first Pride March who was not far away from where that happened and they were scared so it's a very tricky

A thing as job or if a CEO of switchboard said now everyone has a right to celebrate their pride in their queerness in a way that brings value to them and do we tear people down we'll know and that's where we're getting into the issue here. I try as hard as I can. I'm not saying I'm perfect to live by a motto of is everything that I do and including what I say and how I do it because process is just as important as the end result coming from a place of

Kindness, and I think that when police can be your be even reasonably perceived to be misusing power in a very difficult note here where we have on the situation last year where someone who yelled it sudha Uncle them pseudo Nazis gets assaulted by police at a

demonstration in March last year, but the police don't really do anything about the Nazis. It's not a good look. So maybe we've all got to look at how we come at this from a place of

Kindness and rather than from I'll say legalistic dots and commas, which I think is a problem. And I think that when we start looking at this from a police procedure manual or a section at Section 3 Clause 1 a approach of whatever law we're not going to get it right. We really need a more human approach on this and now I can only speak here from the Victorian context there had been good work done with the community encounters program.

But he's that being lost in the broader police culture. I don't know. I haven't been involved for a few years. So I think the thing that I'd say here there are no all-or-nothing answers. There's no right. All right or wrong answers and people have a right to view points. Now linking that back Jenny to your situation. It will probably there has already been debate on social media a various forms about the situation very police.

As you know, the fact that a police officer is accused of killing a gay couple and their and there's all sorts of accusations going on about which I'm avoiding just to be, you know safe from a point of view of my point of view and three see ours you've extended your email here made just to serve its course and I agree with that and I hope that it does and I think that

Somehow I struggle I sometimes struggle myself with the idea that I feel that there's lots of lovely people in the world. But some days it just seems there's a lot of more intense unkindness. We see it on social media. We see it with intense actions and intent and intense words, for example against trans people so often it's

I don't know, you know sort of how we overcome that except with more kindness and that may sound very cheesy. But it's I don't know what else Works do we look into our hearts as well. As our heads I suppose is what I'm trying to say. It's a really sort of the as I say, there's no easy answer to this. It's as I say, it's a highly emotive issue, but I think if we block those

Shins then we're all in trouble and everyone has to look at those feelings and how we deal with it. It's not an easy one. But I think you hit you know, you've got it right on the button where you say condolences to the police officers families of the police officers and friends. That's the critical thing there. You've popped another message in here that your sister went to the Taylor Swift concert and people giving out friendship bracelets to police and amazing and positive experience. I think that's how a younger generation build Bridges.

Yeah, we'll look and I know far be it for me for this 50 fading 58 year old ha-har to talk about younger people, but anyone of any generation needs to do to build Bridges to be kind and it also leads to comment on Taylor Swift. I admit that the style of music is perhaps not mine, but you know, lots of styles of music heart mind and if someone's happy and it's not hurting anyone to listen to it and I can't see that it is.

All I can say is yay for all the taytay's and the Swift is and all the rest of it, you know, and that's sort of what we need, which is really good that we have some sort of know that sort of positivity out there. We need that sort of thing and you need more of it. So as I say not easy topics to deal with

And you need careful debate on it. There's no all enough things as I say and I think that's where people are getting it wrong. And I think we also need to find better ways in our own communities to look at some of these issues. I think that we too many of our influences now are we're not

getting a broad enough range of view point across to the broader society and there is this aisle will it's you know,

Still a bit of that. We got a marriage equality. It's all fixed. Well now it seems like we're into a lot of more micro issues for lack of a better word issues and by micro, I mean issues affecting specific groups and individuals rather than a broader thing and it means that perhaps some of the people who fought for marriage equality who are looking at it from a very cisgender gay and lesbian assimilation as point of view may not have the empathy to speak for those who are affected. I say it every time I can I speak for

People of color I can empathize and Edge kindness, but I can't speak directly. So there's a lot to think about in there. You know, I think it's at the point that our community needs to debate and debate carefully whether we want the sort of you know humble leadership that I think we need is I think part of the problem. I'm not sure we're getting it. I think there's a lot of sort of leadership in our community communities.

That's now very ego and career-driven and he's not coming from enough a place of compassion enough and that's a core a big statement. But now I think that we need to be to sort of start looking at that in a very big way and how we can keep doing more of that. I think we'll have a couple of messages then come back and wrap up today's first show live, New Life.
