And it's very interesting that seahorse Victoria has been running for 50 years. A lot of the broader LGBT groups around the celebrating around the 30 year mark as things began to emerge after decriminalization of consensual sex between gay men in the 1980s groups, formed some of no longer with, or no organizations with some no longer with us, such as the also Foundation, but seahorse is still there. And I think now they're, biased as I am as someone whose life member of the organization and was on the committee for four years from 1995 to 1999, we need all the supports and places we can get, and there's various niches sub-niches, it's great that we have a group like, the shed, for example, for Trans mask and similar ish. So, I think it's really good that we have these groups and that we've got a history in that light. You have been on the button. Wanted the thoughts on the death of a wrestling character by the name of Hulk Hogan and I don't mean died in any sense in the ring and well, it's a suppose, the issues.

The issue is here, we talking about the death of a person named Terry Bollea, who played a wrestling character Hulk Hogan. And now it's sort of its, you know, I'm going to ask that, you know, people listen to the total of what I have to say. Rather than one particular sentence, the general gist, which I feel and around the, you know, people who know little about the person, those in wrestling,

Has been that people are sad, that the character Hulk Hogan has died, but there is not a lot of sadness for the person. Terry Gene Bollea dying. Lets, you know, I'm not ignoring anything but let's do the positive bit. First, the man obviously connected. A lot of people to wrestling when it was all it ever was in its fake density opinion year, which still exists to some extent. It brought it into people's mm awareness. He did it.

If you're a fan of wrestling and I'm going to, please, let me, let me go through the whole thing. He it meant a lot to people and inspired people to get involved in wrestling, it got them connected whether they're a fan or in, as some wrestling commentator from Oklahoma. Jim Ross says in the industry, all that sort of thing. And there's no doubt he had Charisma as a performer. And there is no doubt that he entertained people in that way. That sort of stuff. You know, that is positive. But the thing is, Terry Gene Bollea of the person. Well you know there's aren't you know let's just call the obvious. There's not a lot. Sadly of positive to say and Jenny has hit it on the head with this article, by America's NBC News, which hasn't really been covered a lot in Australia's commercial media. I did briefly see in my socials and article by obese Australia's ABC. Of course, which is why we need a good abc here.

He looks at the contradictions but this article from NBC in America Hulk Hogan's death, resurfaces painful contradictions for black wrestling fans you know sort of is right on the button

is the headline here and the thing is in the mid 2010 is for those not aware Hogan made, some was caught on tape, making tremendously racist remarks that I will not repeat using a very offensive racist word.

Once as a union, big, big, big, big, big big, big inverted, commas slip, and in being big inverted, commas three times virtually in the one parrot, small paragraph, in relation to his daughter, dating a black man which was not good obviously, it was disgusting. And the fact that when he was caught out, he couldn't apologize. He couldn't move with the times. It was my privacy was invaded and all that sort of thing was really

Really sad. But there are other things as well. He was not respectful to his wives over time. His son, unfortunately was an alcoholic and had issues. I'm not sure where Nick Hogan and his son is that now. And there are other things as well, and I sort of, I'm for me, my mind, went to when he was interviewed on, you can just simply find this which is on TMZ. It's only a short 28 second one. Unfortunately, I haven't got a particular Jack so I can't connect my laptop to the panel today. But the Hulk Hogan talks about how he Hulk Hogan is willing to fight fell on Fox. A trans woman. MMA fighter and doesn't respect Fallon's gender, so not good at all. Now, not obviously on the same scale in terms of the

Racism and other things. But behind the scenes in the industry, it may not be well known for those. Not interested in this weird World of Wrestling that Hulk Hogan was a power player. I won't use the word politics in that sense, political and of course, I think most 3 CR listeners would be condemning of him appearing at Donald Trump's Republican convention situation last year. But in terms of his influence in wrestling, he would, let's, let's

Cola spider shovel wrestling is obviously what it is and you know, someone can sometimes you're going to win. Sometimes, you're going to lose in inverted commas. That's Ian. Who is Black remembers watching WWE and says, I still love America. I still love the WWE. It's an emotional contradiction that I choose to deal with because I still find Value in it. So, that's coming from a person who's of direct experience in the issue, and I think that's where it sits for a lot of people. Unfortunately, it seems this point WWE on their shot, one of

Was it really charismatic or planting that seed of ugly nationalism in a wrestling context? Yeah, look, I don't think you can generalize. Does it is, you know, I think that wrestling has moved with the times to some extent. I totally agree with you Jenny that it was

Machismo homophobic and other things, racial stereotypes, racist, the whole thing in the 70s and 80s. And that wasn't just WWE. I certainly remember watching the Australian world championship wrestling, and there were not see characters portrayed and all that sand in a Jedi characters that sort of thing playing on those stereotypes. But I would be happy to say in Balance. Now there are characters people such as Finn Balor and Irish wrestler in WWE who at WrestleMania 30 In New Orleans after Hurricane. Katrina did his entrance with many LGBT people in Bella Club t-shirts with his ballot Club logo, in rainbow colors. I have one of those t-shirts. So, there's that sort of thing you've got Daniel. They that don't match our gender identity and forms Healthcare. These are things that we have in common but yes, we're all different individuals. I'm the wacky trans person who's involved in wrestling and then there's some someone else didn't trans who's a computer geek and all that sort of thing. So, we're all in that sense. Yes, we're all different. So I'd but I'm not really following the logic of Georgia's comments here all his fats because no one said, all Trevor said,

Trans people our and won't speak for black people or all Jewish. People are we're all different were all individuals with individual views and experiences and all that sort of thing. So, you know, it shows in the context of this whole program that once again, very few things are all or nothing. And, you know, the that it is possible to agree and disagree with people, I might have said a couple of weeks ago, that one of my theories of the world with

Social media. Now is that we somehow a times pushed into internet or being attempted.
