And it's the fighting autism Championship which he uses in a way to promote.

Visibility and last night on a show where I was commentating, which is probably why I've got less voice today lock, he defended his title against someone else who's high on the autism kaleidoscope and they nicely played off that but the ring announcer. One of my friends Kenny announced that he was neurodivergent when announcing the match the crowd he went with his gut and then myself and another neurodivergent person on comment

3 then talked about it while we were doing the commentary and it was just one of those nice moments. Now, there were two people at ringside as happens in wrestling and the referee I haven't met to find out if they identify as neurodivergent but I just think what it's things like that. Where it just happens spontaneously and you put that visibility out there regardless of the setting. Of course it could have been anywhere, I just think was really really heartwarming. So very, very nice to see. And now just, it led me.

The along with nulls, the story of the now, sadly late null Tovey to think about you know visibility and what it did. I know one of my two of my early role models when it came to visibility were two enormous enormously important. Trance Role Models. I'll use the word seniors and Elders Kayleen. But I knew I sort of wanted to be involved and they provided great guidance for me as a trans person and as a trans woman and a still two of my best friends and if I perhaps have never seen them maybe I'd have stopped doing what I was doing or maybe not been able to do it as well. And I think it's just really important that we

I have people, as I said in the first segment across all the intersections that where we can see a broad range of representation and sort of see ourselves and it's not just, of course in advocacy. When we have remember some years ago, there was stories of a trans woman astronaut, which was quite exciting. And then, well, I'm going to member

We've seen Josh Cavallo come out in a lie, ground ball or soccer as its called

We've, I'm pretty sure there's people out in Rugby Union but still no known past or present, gay or bisexual cisgender men AFL players. And that's I think there's, you know, I don't know said this before, you know, at the senior level, of course I would add. I mean, we've had people that sort of country levels and others and there's been trans men for that matter at that level and

People have done great work in sport to get things going and people playing in The Pride cup and similar things. But I just, you know, I think no one maybe no one wants to be first and face such a barrage. Surely, there's a network even if it's a bit will say underground at the moment whereby people could sort of get together and have a few of them, do it, somehow? Surely, it's got to be worked out. I think that would make

Make a great difference and it's unfortunate that perhaps people still don't feel that they can do it as the home immense Home and Away football, season comes to an end. Yet another one gone, of course, many women in who are out, either is lesbian, probably some bisexual and I know there's at least two or three non-binary players in a FLW but of course sadly with

The what I would consider the distorted conversation and maybe I'm being very polite. There about trans women in sport, not going to happen. But, you know, I think that the media room and takes a very limited view of things and doesn't go into much depth on it. I mean, you know, if there is, if I'm going to say, if there was some negativity of any sort directed by the so-called pro-trans demonstrators against the let women speak, demonstrators well, why isn't there any reporting on what the

The wet let women speak. People are saying I mean if they are saying I'm transphobic things, shouldn't it be reported and commented on a noting that it might be hate speech. So I think that mainstream media could learn could sort of lift its game on that but it also links into why we need positive role models. There's been plenty of research over time that people's views on trans change where they know a person. So it

Have to be a role model like the first possible trans astronaut or a public Advocate or an artist or anything like that. If you've known a trans person in your life and it's like, oh they're a person gee, they're just trying to pay the bill, pay the rent by the groceries, maybe have some enjoyment in life, it's like I G. Isn't that what I'm doing is a cisgender person and so I think that visibility comes across in many many ways as to

Why we need it on any level? And so if you are that out person in a situation whether it's a school or a workplace and you know, you're doing your best, I think people will sort of warm to that and go according I remember catching up with someone who ran one of the very early trans support groups in Melbourne, transgender Liberation and

Here. Some years later, at a forum, sort of panel discussion, and the Chance moments. I'll just say worked in. What would be considered in? I hope this is still an appropriate term, a blue-collar occupation. And she said, I retired from the advocacy and then said, but I helped a couple of people come out as Trans in my blue collar job. And I looked at her and said, did you say you'd retired from advocacy and she smiled and said, no, I'm still doing something and that is equally as important.

As the anyone who's doing something publicly, whether it's this croaky voiced person today. I'm trying to do a radio show or anything else. I think is just so important and so every little bit counts, every little bit makes a difference and you know just keep bringing it along is how I would see it. So yeah, very very important that we do all these things and you know sort of everyone plays A Part

As much as they safely can we should acknowledge that. Some people may not be safe to come out in a particular workplace school, and of course, knowledge in that locations. Other countries could be very, very unsafe. And there's the obvious ones. The rush is the Uganda, as the possible. You know, the Saudi Arabia is to give a few random ones, but of course we're seeing it becoming sadly increasingly unsafe in so-called

Liberal Western democracies like the UK and the USA and what a difficult situation that is. So yeah that sense of visibility connection can be very, very important for all sorts of people in all sorts of ways, it will say, at all levels and length and depth and breaths and angles of society. Mmm, so again, if you've had someone who's given you visibility,
