How many queer trans or any part of the proverbial rainbow amazing comedians and performers there are in the Melbourne International Comedy Festival.

And you know how many I get to interview it just it really gladdens my heart to think that we have that sort of entertainment and one such queer comic is on the zooms now with me and that's Chloe Petts.

I'm Chloe. Welcome to 3 CR. Hi Sally, thank you so much for having me Chloe. Well well yeah, welcome to 3 CR and we're just discussing before you come on and he's welcome back to Melbourne you'll hear once again for a part of any reasons, of course, you've but none the one we want to talk about, I suppose of great of great note, is your show in the Melbourne International Comedy Festival, big naturals where I just, which I've got to find out. Well, you can hint or tease at the answer that don't have to give a direct answer but I loved the first. You know, the way this describe it just got me this is scribed on The Comedy Festival, website at Comedy Festival.com dot. Are you taking a deep dive into their upbringing at the height of the lad culture and you bring in from fronting, a Christian rock band accidents on the golf course. And it's your most loutish to a yet dive in. First of all, what was the inspiration for doing a show like this? Well, to be honest, like when I sit down and write a show, I have to wait for just a bolt

from the blue of just like, right what, what am I going to write about? There's never sort of, like any calculation to have like this year, I'm going to write about ladder culture, It was just that, that, that seemed to be what rice to the Rose to the top. And I think it's probably interesting like thinking about lad culture in the context of now, right? Because I feel like we always have. History is a pendulum that swings, right? Mmm. And I think that any time women or minorities, get some kind of vague movement towards equality. There's a swing in the opposite direction.

And this kind of these laddish these laddish kind of you know, movements happen. So lad culture was sort of a response to third-wave feminism. Now we've got sort of this manner manner sphere stuff as a response to the me to movement and so yeah, I guess I was just interested about thinking how those things keep happening and maybe just to cut kind of like calm myself down a little bit because I'm like we've moved through it before will move through it again and then it will come back again and it will just keep hopefully getting a little bit better.

Each times. Well, this is the hope that, you know, there will be two steps forward for the proverbial one step backward or two meters forward for one meter backwards, not Sun. So as not to be a blast I suppose, which is a fair fair thing to say. But you know it is, it is a challenge I suppose. The thing is, you know, in this time where we're seeing, as you say, mansphere magum and all the other similar names, how do you sort of

How do you find the humor in it? And how did how did you bring you these two parts this how do you find humor in it? How do you bring it into the personal, you know and your own experience that you know again looking at some of the things in that descriptor on The Comedy Festival website. Yeah. I mean it's interesting because I never think any of my comedy is overly political because I just don't think in that way and I think that there's other comedians that are doing political stuff far

Better than I ever could. So I guess my political stance has to be like the person was political, right? And I just try and remember that the fact that I'm kind of standing up in front of a room full of people as a queer person in this time, where a lot of people who have a lot of loud voices. Want to tell us that that's not okay. Like the fit for me, for me, that's Defiance. And I think what I try and do in this show about lad culture and about growing up in that. And and and and the content is

Basically, like lad culture was intoxicating, there was loads of incredible stuff, it's just fun to look at, you know, breasts on the third page of a newspaper. But in the UK, you know, it's fun to listen to Lad Rockets fun to go to the football, but there's sort of, I guess a dark underbelly that comes with it. So yeah, I think talking about that stuff on stage and trying to like, show people that maybe have a similar experience to me, that they're

Dented. But also people that don't have a similar experience to me that they're allowed to be included in that conversation and that actually, these conversations aren't as scary as they think they are. And we're not this sort of nebulous group of inaccessible, whoa, keys that want to ruin their lives. I feel like, yeah, that's what I'm sort of try. Like politically trying to do in a quiet way, but mainly I'm just trying to make people laugh, which is a damn fine thing for comedy. And I think the thing is, it sounds very much.

Like you're doing it with authenticity and that's something that regardless of politics and want to say politics, politics or not. Whatever that politics is, heaven knows we need that at the moment there. Just seems to be a, well, I'll say, in terms of visible culture of All Sorts. You know, I think of, well, politicians being the obvious one there, just seems to be a very severe shortage of authenticity. Everyone just, you know, has predetermined lines and

Says what they want in the minute, that sort of thing. And I think they're for authenticity is a damn fine thing.

I hope so. Yeah, I hope that you can be sort of like a fully rounded individual with like flaws and good qualities and bad qualities and in inconsistencies and hypocrisy is like, I hope that that's yeah, maybe that will cut through somewhere. Well, when you will have to, you'll have to go and

see big natural at The Comedy Festival to find out what are y'all at. Can you tease it? Tease or out, answer outright are you?

Your call on. What? What's the you know? The the where did that title come from? Because I often know talking to a lot of comics as I said there's just been so many great Comics at The Comedy Festival. And in last year at Melbourne Fringe, all all Queer. The often you write a show and then the title comes out last a bit like that University sa. We do the introduction and the conclusion last not chronologically was there any sort of anything that comes? What was what was behind big naturals? Well, I'm not really sure.

I just thought it was quite funny, so I actually called it up for, I'd written it. I did it the other way around, so I didn't really know what the show is going to be about them. Unfortunately, it sort of became vaguely thematically relevant but it was me and my mate I don't we just found it really funny to refer to

Speak that shows because it felt like very archaic and very like you. Yeah. It's just, it just was really funny to us because like, it's it just feels like, you know, someone using that phrase is like a man for me in the 90s sat like dialing up the modem so that he could like type into Bing like Nigella Lawson big naturals and that

That that just made me laugh. And then I just, I just said, if I called my show, that my maid was laughing. I think you got a cool you show that, and then it's just them. It's also amused me.

Because like, I have to come and do many interviews like this which, which I absolutely love.

But sometimes, then was interesting as this Sally, sometimes it is for BBC Radio Norfolk, and they go, they can be a little bit dry and

And it just really funny a serious radio presenter. Having to say Chloe pets, please, will you tell us about your big naturals that I just thought you would add some amusement for the depressed or I liked it? I liked it. I what I would actually say that my radio mentor and another community

But there's so many things that you know, that you can talk about here. A Christian rock band. I've got to get some hints about that for our listeners on 3. CR. Tell us about a Christian rock band Chloe. Yeah. I joined a Christian rock band when I was a teenager. I look II.

I was I guess religious, but being in the Christian rock band was mainly to hang out with my friends. Luke and Rachel, ha ha. And yeah, it was a, it was purely social. And it was like it was just so much fun like playing music with my mates. And also, like, I'm not that good at music so I couldn't really be in a mainstream band because I wasn't good enough, but the Christians they had to accept me.

Ever. So you know, when I was a like offbeat on my bass guitar, you know, it contained within it was all in honor of the law. You can't berate me for that. Well, this is this is good to see that there's some true Christian acceptance out there in the true Spirit of Christianity in Jesus bullet. I think that's a fair thing and I very much so I yeah. I mean

I think I'm a skeptical of organized religion as the next person and the things that it's done to, you know, a press oppress. Our community, of course, you do. I think, I think it was interesting to me is like, my mom is very religious and she's like a lay preacher, which is basically she can do everything, but I'm not sure what's the maybe wedding. She could do everything but Weddings But my

Is like Christian in the kind of traditional sense in that she's like we love the gays, we love the immigrants, we love the sex workers. You know, she she takes like you know the teachings of Jesus literally where she's like we love everyone, we support everyone and we go for everyone and that that's kind of made me a bit more open to like

The Christian side of spirituality because I see her model it, so radically and so beautifully and like see the teaching that she gives star don't people in the church that might otherwise not

have heard those arguments. So yeah I get what the church has done to our people but also I love my mom and I love the values that she hasn't what? And she's practicing what he preaches. So that's that's called. Yeah look, I think your eyes are really  
Good point there, that it is so much about values rather than, you know, sort of all or nothing, you know, religion, religion, bad, not millat, religion, good. All that's the thing. There's no, there's no all or nothing here. There's wonderful, Christians Jewish, Islamic people. And some well, maybe not so good because people are people, all that sort of thing. And, you know, if religion helps lift someone and then they can lift someone else in a way that that person.

Then it's a good thing. When y'all know I suppose we're getting into faith more than religion. And, you know, I think that's just sad that what start out as good religious ideas in a lot of religions, you know, do get well twist it or well in the both, the ethical and the financial sense corrupted. So, yeah, let's not knock religion and just the other thing to say, at least you were playing bass at some for string. What is it for string? So it's a bit easier.

Yeah, for string. So it's a bit easier. And also, you can just like, Go bomb, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah. And that is, why did for a lot of, a lot of the songs was basically, just like, keeping keeping Rhythm and not even doing that very well. Yeah, not that sounds that sounds. You've learned how to walk and swear simultaneously is that your experience or was it better?

What was that? Sorry, you caught a tiny bit that you asking me about golf your golf? Yes, yes. Walking and swearing similar. Tiny sleigh as it was just once described. Yeah, it does feel like, I'm the quick like, the quintessential e. It was well, it's very masculine, but it's also very, very lot of lesbians play golf, don't know. It feels. Yeah, I don't know. There's, there's something about going and escaping.

To, you know, many acres of land and being away for four hours. That feels very cathartic. Yes, I played golf when I was younger with my dad. The routine that happens in the show about playing golf with my dad is. I had an accident on the golf course which probably led to some swearing. I would say. Hmm and look this is a, this is a classy radio show. I'm not going to go into the details of the accident.

But when I say accident is exactly the kind of accident that you're thinking, and if you want to hear more about that, then please come to the show. Not too many graphic details are shared because the story in quite simple. But yes. An accident on the golf course. I hope that is enticing enough. Yeah no I'm thatthat. But yeah, I just I feel so lucky every time I come here because yeah, it just the weather's, beautiful. Some of the time. Yeah. The food is incredible. I like you were saying off are beforehand that like, it seems

Like it's taking a bit of time to recover from Covent but every time I come back here there's at least like 10 or 15 new food, places that I want to try and it really feels like there's like a boom in this kind of like food Enos of this city. The people of good you have loads of space to run around and Frolic in a way that you don't in London, everyone pushes each other and gets angry and London. Hmm. Yeah. I don't know, I just absolutely love it. I just feel so lucky that I get to come and spend a lot of my time here.

Yeah, look Aunt. I think you raise a good point and, you know, look, I don't know, I don't want to sound like a tourist advertisement or anything but I'm grateful. I live here for many reasons, the Arts the, you know, the the moderate climate. Yes, it's changeable. Which of course, is our running in joke, along with the strange, right-hand turns, the sun casts have to make in the Central Business District, South Melbourne, similar all those sorts of things. But you know there are worse places to be. I'm very fortunate.

And I now live in the inner north of the city which is a the first to admit it to queer bubble, but I think bubbles are good. You've got to have a safe place but you've also got to try to venture out of them, you know, push get beyond the comfort zone as they say, so yeah, I'll give her a cheer for Melbourne as well and enjoy it. But the thing is, we want people to enjoy your comedy show, which is big naturals riches.

Out of the Melbourne, International Comedy Festival. When when and where do they see? And hear this show. Look, we've got, we've got about a week left, I'm off on Monday so we've got exactly seven more shows. I think it's 8810 tonight because it's Sunday and then every other night, it's 9:10. It's at the Town Hall in the portrait room.

Which is a very fun room to perform in because there is a portrait of many, many mayors looking over me as I perform that which is quite intimidated. But last year, it was, it was about eight old white mares and they've now replaced some of the white mares with some other pictures which I do discuss. And yeah, it's just a great setting to perform comedy for the good people of Melbourne. So yeah, Melbourne town.

Portrait room 910 every day apart from some days when it's 810 a Mondays when it doesn't happen at all. But yeah, I would love your listeners to come because yeah, it feels like an incredibly interesting radio channel and I'm sure that the people that listen to it are of a good sort definitely aren't. Yes, as I always say on this show, we don't we don't have regular listeners on 3 CR, we have awesome listeners. So I hope they do. Come on, I'll have to I wish I could get along myself to talk about that and of course there's as we like to call it tight ass choose days where the prices are a bit cheaper so we can balance the audience out and then. And just as I say, keep it going, we need the authenticity, we need humor. It's a tonic that. We all need all the time and just by being yourself, you're putting your kindness and uniqueness into the world and we definitely will take all of that.

Yeah. Snug as a friend of mine used to say "sner.". Gosh, I don't want. I don't like, I don't really like winter. Well, unless you get to wear fake fur coats or something. Anyway, what a great guest. Chloe Petts was. Yep. Big naturals as part of the Comedy Festival. I will have to find a way somehow to get along and see that this week and yeah, on a showery day here in. Wacky. Land of ours, got lots of news to catch up on and I do. Thank our various listeners like roving reporter and others who have and Jenny who have come in with queries about events and happenings in terms of queer and trans stuff in the last few weeks.

Well, one and this is, I suppose we're I'll raise a general content note for transphobia and give the numbers for switchboard in including sorry Q life including switchboard in Victoria and Tasmania Q Life and National queer focused Counseling Service 1-800 1845 to seven rainbow door, one eight hundred seven to nine three six seven because we had the blanket ban decision from the international Olympic Committee to ban trans and intersex women from women's sports for the Olympics.

And well as I realized, you know, I was about to make a flippant sort of remark or imitate something, but it's just utterly ludicrous. You know, we've been since seen, then we've had billiards and darts banned trans women are strength, stamina and physique Advantage there in billiards and darts. The same as it was with, I think a year or so ago when chess chimed in on it. And this is why trans people have said, it has to be.

Nuanced that about how we do. You know I'm trans and into and and people with variation of sex characteristics in sport because clearly that's not an issue. And now the thing is whether it is in other sports and I'll start by saying non-contact Sports, we all know that trans women, I'll start with trans women do lose a lot of strength and stamina,

Anna. I'm not okay. We don't shrink I'm in. I was 187 cm tall before I started hormones and affirmed my gender identity and I still am. But this idea that there's some sort of an advantage in that is just utterly ludicrous. And interestingly, there's now been a piece of research on a cover it. Looking at all the research on this, which finds there isn't conclusive evidence.

It's of the benefits of testosterone yet this this well, myth, in my opinion, is the politest word. I can use that's half of an eight-letter word. You can guess what? Eight-letter word. I might like to use is just seems to pervade things. This whole combination of media, Sensei elements of media sensationalizing trans issues, including sport sort of elements of

Yeah, sort of Politics, the so-called gender criticals and all the rest of it and it just really is just does not make any sense and I'm going to give an example of how silly, not only with the three examples that, you know, I'm I just mentioned now, I know, you know, all right, let's get it out of the way first. The running joke on this show is my love of professional wrestling 1237. And one second was the mention today.

But actually, it's in context today. I think there's lots of ways, professional wrestling can be described in terms of the physical aspects. One of my dear wrestling friends described it as an absurd form of physical theater. It has some similarities to acrobatics where you've got to catch people. And in that sense, it is what we'll just say, it is what it is. But really strength, stamina and physique, don't play a part. And, I mean, let's

The side, very differences of sex and gender for a minute, there was one that always comes to mind from many years ago in wrestling where Rey Mysterio 175 pounds. So, I'm just doing some quick mathematics there that would be about 80 kilos took on the Big Show. I'm a poor white whose around 500 pounds when he was at that time and yet both, as far as I know cisgender to endow, six men to hunt

And twenty six kilos and how I want you. Of course, that's not a sporting contest but it's there because it is what it is. But it's a big very big person's, 7 foot tall. And you know, 226 kilos or 210 CM if we're going to be consistent in our measurement scheme versus Rey Mysterio, who's probably around 150 cm tall. And yet the reason I'm mentioning all this is that I got a About this for a recent media interview, that hit the guardian back in February and the reporter initially just didn't get it and said oh but there must be a code of conduct to deal with this. Well, I mean, you know, maybe she didn't understand professional wrestling and I'll grant you that I don't either in all seriousness. Wow. You know. Yeah. That's how much it took. No, we have to give thanks to a local queer. Sis woman wrestler, Charlie

Ins. Who Cheves as she calls herself, who is very strong about, not using the term inter-gender wrestling because really, you know, jet sex and gender don't matter and she might have some very forthright comments and just shows really for wrestling. Let's start there and I'll come back on topic in a nice neurodivergent.

Why in a second you know how you know, sort of silly the ideas? You know can be. And so the thing is let's get take this now Beyond sex and gender, if you've got someone 150 pounds versus someone 500 pounds. Well maybe that's a different thing in a true contact sport. But does it matter whether the / how the person was assigned or

What they are now or what variation of sex characteristics, they have probably not. And so the thing is the science to use that favorite word, that shock jocks and right-wing types love to use you know, so much proves that there isn't this testosterone myth. There's also a great book called testosterone the untold story which cans the myths of testosterone, which I I've looked at in brief must get around to reading again, in depth, and was naturally written by by a woman. And it's just, I'm really, you know, sort of

Are just so silly and so, very disappointing. Well, I guess in all honesty, it was probably done to avoid a fight with Mr 4547 over the Olympics, whether it will be reversed after this Olympics, we don't know. And, you know, we'll have to wait and see. Probably there was some ID, my guess is, there was some pressure

That, you know, from the American government or there was some sort of sort of behind the scenes goings-on. I also don't have much faith in Sebastian Coe. Yeah, he's a great Runner. He's probably a nice guy. But is he a scientist? I'm the president of the ioc. So I've just really think somehow we'll kind of like what Chloe was saying that the pendulum will have to swing back in the end. And I think will someone in the end somehow will challenge this and actually take it to court. Now that's going to be Channel difficult to some extent. And you know because it's not you know, they'll be people trying to distort the evidence but somehow there's got to be some clarity on this.

This that is done by a good process, in my opinion. And in the end, we will get there. But right now, obviously, a very stupid decision and I'm just trying to find the name of the dart player who has now, had to retire because she just can't compete anywhere. opinion. You know what is the time? Just quit using my individual freedom to call it as I see it. Hey and the other thing is why don't we organized sport? We are regardless. Our sorry. Not regardless putting a you know at least give it a try sometime.

Organizing sport regardless of sex or gender but on total overall ability because there must be you know, some women who are better than say lower-ranked, minji sounds like some of the you know, one of the things that when the anti-equality types or SAR, why should we have affirmative action? It'll Mean woman's taking men, women taking men's jobs. Well, if there's women who deserve the job, more at the moment that means there's some Less competent, meaning that job. Well, if that shows up some men to be, you know, not as good as the some of the women are non-binary people and people with variation of sex characteristics who cared, who cares. So maybe we need to look at how we organized sport by some other way, other than sex or gender is it ability? Is it sighs, is it by now? And you can we measure bone density for everyone? Rather than just some people, and of course, X testing is another ridiculous component of this ban, which is takes us back 20 years and so many sports bodies and human rights. Groups have condemned it and the 29 year old darts player who's been impacted by this ridiculous ruling from the darts regulation Authority in the world Arts Federation is no oil in Van. Lea-vin Noah Lynn just compassion to you and I hope you can find happiness and purpose in life in some other way. So yes, there's my rant and I'm proud to do it on 3 CR because I think 3 CR is probably the only place where we can have in terms of traditional Electronic media where this sort of debate will at least be fair. And in that light, I'm going to play a couple of quick messages and then come back and talk about a slightly Well, dare I say, I'm going to go for today. I loved it a few years ago where he got a drag makeover and was gale warning just is one of the best appropriate drag names. And of course, we love a good pun on 3 CR, you know, sort of like anything.

However, on a very serious note and I will raise content note warning. I'll say overall to me. medium here mention of pedophilia because the right wing media have been running on this story in over the recent weeks and months. And I'm going to say this, I think 3 CR is possibly the only Media or the best place media in Melbourne / Naarm possibly up there as one of the best place media to talk about this with and try to look at it carefully and balance, because I don't think any trans person would want to comment on mainstream media and I'll, let's start with why that would be obviously pedophilia is horrible. You know, first thoughts have to go to victims, survivors and loved ones of the victims and survivors of it horrible. Horrible thing. But let's also try to sort of get past that, you know, that sort of the things? And the emotions totally

acknowledge them. They are people's truth. When we look at this issue that has been raised of a trans woman in a woman's prison. Where the person is, I don't know, you know where there's Alex, you know, sort of alleged to be a pedophile. Now, I'm not, I don't want to go into whether the person is or not, or a conviction or not, but the thing is, let's look at this carefully and And go through it bit by bit. First of all, why should that stop other trans women have nothing to do with pedophilia being put in a women's prison? So let's get past the emotion. And look at this calmly if it is. And the Victorian guidelines that have been enforced for at least 15 years as I understand them. Still are that for when you've got someone with variation of sex characteristics or who is trans or gender? Diverse. There's a combination of factors that need to be looked at the safety of that person, the safety of other people in custody and the safety of custodian or staff. And this is what needs to be considered. So a trans woman who lets a, is a white-collar criminal should that person, you know, that person is probably possible, more likely, all other things being equal, best placed in women's prison, if that is going to be best for that person. Now if someone has been a pedophile or is violent, then obviously safety needs to be considered, but the thing is, can that be done in a way without doing solitary confinement? That minimizes contact with other prisoners and let's face it. Now, the is, you know, would if the trans woman is put in a Men's prison wouldn't with the other men necessarily be safe. There might be some men who wouldn't be a cisgender male white collar criminal in there might not be saved. So how do you deal with that? And then the other thing that comes up is pedophiles are at least predominantly attracted to Children if they're nowhere near children and there are relatively few children in women's prisons, what is the issue? So go.

Is once we start looking at this more carefully, breaking it down. This issue has to be tackled, but I'd be quite honest with you with your listings. I would not be willing to comment on this on any mainstream virtually. Any mainstream media Outlet in Australia? I don't believe, I would get a fair hearing and, you know, sort of fun. That's why I'm I've decided to comment on it here, and thank you. I can't remember whether it was Jenny or roving reporter who asked me about this my apologies, it's just been a lot of things to catch up on over the last few weeks but that's why I've held off on this. And this is why I don't want to well to use the phrase used by Khloe and in their interview blow smoke or anything. But this is where 3 CR is possibly. The only media outlet that's able to handle this carefully because there is a willingness to look at it In a balanced way,

which I have not seen in any commercial media and I don't blame anyone who wouldn't. As I say, who was trying to take a balanced view from not going on Commercial media. I also understand that one, one of the victims, the victims of violence, from the alleged alien alleged violent, it's trans woman prisoner was wanting to sort of speak to mainstream media and say, look, I don't want to victimize victimized or stereotype or vilify all trans women either, but probably didn't think they'd get a fair hearing, and that's sad, too, because we're not hearing even from them. So, these are things that, you know, sort of have to get discussed somewhere. And at least get this argument out into the open in a better way, but as I say trust mainstream media to do it?

Well, I'm not so sure what's the old gag about the right The mainstream media that is that the Murdoch journalist you thought ethics was a county in England. Anyway,

Roving reporter. Hello to you roving. You're out there but not as out there as the crew of the our teams have been over the last week on The Far Side of the Moon.
